
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Here is the Map which shows the variety of different walk trails which takes you around the Lake and also leads to Colwick Country Park

A Warm Welcome to Colwick Hall Hotel

We hope you enjoy your stay with us.

Colwick Hall stands on a site which has been occupied ever since Saxon days and the names of the owners are legion

Starting at 1086

Colwick Hall was first recorded in the Domesday Book. Held by the service of twelve barbed arrows which you can see today on our main gates and grand staircase

Owned by Sir Reginald DeColwyck who lived to be a Centenarian

<u>1362</u>

On the death of William DeColwyck, the estate was passed by marriage of his daughter Joan to Sir Richard Byron

1776

The house was remodelled as you see it now by John Carr of York, in a Palladian style with ionic pillars, for Sir John Musters. The current Flemish redbrick face with initials J.M 1776 on lead downpipe hops



800 years of rich history

1827

Jack Musters inherited the hall. The Musters had many relations to the Byron's including Mary Ann Chaworth who was the first woman the famous poet Lord Byron fell in love with

<u>1831</u>

Riots during Second Reform Bill. During this disturbance the main gates were thrown in the lake where it lay rusting and forgotten for many years to then be recovered accidently and is now preserved in Nottingham Castle. Mary Chaworth escaped, hiding in the shrubbery, but received a shock & chill and sadly passed away at Wiverton Hall a few months later



<u>1890'a</u>

Col Horatio Davies who we know as the owner of Pimm's acquired Colwick Hall





<u>1910</u>

As an ideal resort, arriving via steam ship, taking tea on the lawn and staying in bed chambers. Enjoying mirth & laughter whilst being entertained by Pierrots
